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This past year was a productive and busy one for The California Wellness Foundation.

Staff and Board continued with in-depth planning related to the strategic direction of the Foundation's next grantmaking chapter, and the Board approved a strategy in December 2013. The cover story of this Annual Report shares how our experiences over the past 22 years have informed a renewed commitment to health equity, and it provides an overview of the grantmaking program.

The Foundation's "business" of grantmaking continued during 2013 as well. The Board awarded 291 grants totaling almost \$36.5 million. More than 70 percent of these grants were in the form of core operating support. We have found that giving grantees the opportunity to obtain multiyear core operating support provides organizations both flexibility and stability.

Among the grants approved by the Board in 2013 was a cluster to help with California's successful Affordable Care Act implementation. Included in this cluster were:

- **\$3 million for outreach to hard-to-reach populations to enroll in Covered California or expanded Medi-Cal; and**
- **\$2 million to organizations such as community clinic associations to identify strategies to ensure that those who remain uninsured will still have access to care.**

During 2013, the Foundation benefitted from the support of Colburn "Cole" S. Wilbur as our interim president and CEO while the Board of Directors engaged in a national search for a permanent chief executive. As a seasoned foundation leader, Cole was a steady influence for the Board and staff during a time of great transition.

We are happy to share that the executive search yielded a splendid result—Judy Belk as The California Wellness Foundation's president and CEO. Judy's strong leadership skills and expertise in philanthropic operations are real assets to the Foundation. But I think what I value most about Judy is her passion for improving the lives of underserved people. I encourage you to read Judy's message in this Annual Report to become better acquainted with her.

We are eager to launch this next generation of grantmaking at Cal Wellness and excited to work with our partners toward Advancing Wellness throughout California.

The 2013 Annual Report of The California Wellness Foundation truly represents an evolution for the Foundation and for me personally as I assume my new role. I am so gratified by the warm welcome shown by the Cal Wellness community: our community partners, philanthropic colleagues and others who have reached out to share their wisdom or extend a helping hand.

It's been my experience that, within the first week of starting a new job, it's possible to get a sense of the most important elements underlying an organization—its values, its people and the work. At Cal Wellness, I realized early on that I have the honor of working at a vital and vibrant institution. The fit feels good.

I'm joining the Foundation at a historic time. Over the past year, more than 2 million more Californians were able to be covered by health insurance, thanks to the Affordable Care Act and the hard work of many who provide education and outreach.

While we have much to celebrate, there's more to be done to make sure that all Californians have the opportunity to live healthy and well lives. Even with the second open enrollment period for Covered California around the corner, millions of folks will still be left behind, including 1 million Californians who are not eligible for coverage due to their immigration status.

And other barriers to health and wellness remain. Too many of our young people's lives are traumatized by violence, incarceration and lack of economic opportunity. I recently had the sobering experience of visiting an adolescent clinic within a juvenile detention center. Although the clinic is state-of-the-art, and the center is a new model with an integrated approach linking health, counseling, and legal and probation services, the faces of the boys in the maximum security area haunt me. They were young boys, mostly of color, locked up on a bright sunny day when they should have been out playing soccer and daydreaming about college and what they want to be when they grow up.

It was a stark reminder of why the Foundation's long-term investment in changing the narratives for communities facing daunting inequities, including for young men and boys of color, is so important. I am also well aware that, whenever there's a leadership transition at an organization with a history as rich as Cal Wellness', there's bound to be some anxiety both outside and within the organization regarding change. **What's she thinking? What's her vision for the organization? How will our funding be impacted?**

By now I hope you've had the opportunity to review our new Advancing Wellness grantmaking framework, which was formally launched on October 1. I hope you are reassured by what's not going to change—our commitment to the underserved, to core operating support, and to a rock solid belief that the best ideas come from our partners who are doing the work on the ground every day.

And I hope you're as excited as I am about the changes we've made in targeting our resources with a laser focus on bridging the gaps in access and care; promoting healthy and safe neighborhoods; and expanding education and employment pathways. Integrated throughout all of our work will be a continuing commitment to working closely with our partners in advocating for equitable and sound public policies and using our voice to shine the spotlight on unmet needs and the work of our partners.

As many of my colleagues know, I'm a storyteller. I see stories everywhere. In this year's Annual Report we have tried hard to capture the story of our work—honoring the Foundation's past legacy and providing a strong platform as we transition to our Advancing Wellness era. It's an evolving storyline but one where the theme will be based on promoting equity, access and advocacy.

Thank you again for your personal support as I assume the helm of this amazing institution. You have my gratitude for all that you and others do in helping us enhance and improve the lives of Californians.


# Wellness Evolution

Experience ignites a new  
grantmaking chapter.

We've been making grants at The California Wellness Foundation (Cal Wellness) for 22 years now. Our specific philanthropic programs have varied—from staff-directed initiatives to responsive approaches that support community-generated ideas—but a constant has been to base our work on our mission to improve the health of Californians.

Our definition of health is as relevant today as when we first adopted it more than two decades ago. We see health as complete physical, mental and social well-being—not merely the absence of disease. In 2012, our Board of Directors challenged the staff to delve deeper into this definition of health to help inform strategic planning. With this Annual Report, we are excited to share the results of this process and the subsequent evolution of our grantmaking.

What became unmistakably clear during our planning process is the affirmation that health goes way beyond being simply a personal pursuit. As the World Health Organization has noted, a healthy community includes such characteristics as a clean and safe physical environment where basic needs, such as food and shelter, can be met; accessible, high-quality health care services; educational opportunities; and a vital economy. While public health experts refer to these qualities as the social determinants of health, one could also refer to them collectively as a state of wellness.

The California Wellness Foundation also continues to build on its legacy of allocating its support to people and communities that are the most underserved and experience a scarcity of resources. This focus on the underserved is expressive of our core value of equity and our awareness that the quest for wellness is not a level playing field. We are committed to using this health equity lens as our grantmaking continues—with our attention squarely placed on those with the least access to resources needed to live healthy lives.



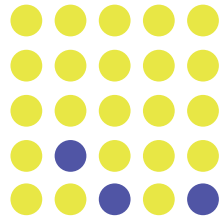
As has been our practice, Cal Wellness encourages community partners to identify, and base funding requests on, their organizations' most pressing needs. We have learned that giving grantees the opportunity to obtain multiyear, core operating support can contribute to their sustainability and improved strength.

We continue to balance proactive grantmaking with responses to unsolicited letters of interest. Through continual dialogue with our community partners, we have learned that often the nonprofit professionals working at the vanguard of entrenched health problems have great insight into how best to address those issues. We have also gained wisdom that has informed our philanthropic focus.

## GRANTMAKING PROGRAM EVOLUTION

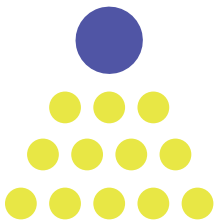
In March 2014, after an extended, in-depth planning process, The California Wellness Foundation's Board of Directors approved a strategy for our grantmaking for the next ten years. Cal Wellness continues to commit to the following guiding principles, which weave throughout our grantmaking:



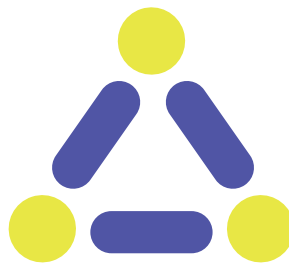
To address the particular health needs of traditionally underserved populations.



To support and strengthen nonprofit organizations that seek to improve the health of underserved populations.



To recognize and encourage leaders who are working to increase health and wellness within their communities.



To inform policymakers and opinion leaders about important wellness and health care issues.

How can maximum benefit be achieved with limited philanthropic dollars? For foundations committed to social change, an answer is to support work in the public policy arena. At Cal Wellness, we have sought to advance public policy through multiple approaches that weave throughout our portfolios.

Grantees that conduct research and analysis have been funded to uncover new issues and solutions and educate policymakers and opinion leaders. Ideas must be refined and advanced through policy analysis, advocacy and public education. Once policies are adopted, oversight activities are often needed, including litigation to ensure effective implementation. Cal Wellness has funded a wide range of nonprofit organizations engaged in this continuum of public policy change.

Over the past 13 years, The California Wellness Foundation has addressed a broad range of issues with our grantmaking. We have now streamlined the grantmaking portfolios to concentrate on some of the highest needs and opportunities.





## Bridging the Gaps in Access and Quality Care

Preventive services and quality care lead to healthier Californians. Health systems and organizations must be strong, equitable and effective in addressing the needs of vulnerable Californians in a rapidly changing landscape. This portfolio includes four issues of particular interest that build upon our past funding for community clinics and other aspects of the safety net.

**Health Care Reform and the Affordable Care Act (ACA)** While the ACA has allowed for an unprecedented number of Californians to gain health coverage, a lot of work remains to maximize this historic opportunity. Grantmaking related to this issue supports: effective and equitable implementation of the ACA in California; improvements to health coverage and insurance to increase access to affordable, quality health care for all—including undocumented Californians; and promotional efforts to tout the benefits and value of health care reform throughout the state.

**The Health Care Safety Net** The health care safety net refers to the system of public hospitals, community clinics and health centers that serve as the primary source of care for vulnerable people in California. Grantmaking related to this issue supports: the delivery of direct preventive and primary care services within communities of greatest need; capacity-building efforts to strengthen, sustain and improve quality of care among safety net providers; and efforts to foster underrepresented minority health professionals working at safety net organizations within their own racial and ethnic communities.

In the years leading up to full implementation of health care reform, our safety net community partners were concerned about their readiness to take on some of the challenges associated with the ACA. To fortify nonprofit health service organizations, Cal Wellness made grants to help them respond more effectively to changing circumstances while continuing to pursue their missions. Below are just a few examples of this type of funding.

**University Muslim Medical Association Clinic** in South Los Angeles, which operates in a medically underserved community, received core operating support to cover the costs associated with becoming a federally qualified health center (FQHC). The ACA relies on FQHCs as critical providers.

**Sonoma Valley Community Health Center** used grant funds to implement electronic health records and quality-improvement activities, which helped the health center prepare to become a patient-centered medical home.

**Anderson Valley Health Center** in Boonville joined forces with four other FQHCs in Mendocino County—where shortages of health care professionals are a major concern. Foundation grant funds were used to develop a shared-services plan that consolidated human resource functions. This model of increased collaboration is helping Mendocino County bring implementation of health care reform to scale.

**Oral Health** The ACA has greatly expanded pediatric coverage for dental services, but oral health care remains beyond the means of many low-income adults, including seniors. Research has shown links between poor oral health and increased risks of heart disease, stroke and poor birth outcomes. Grants related to this issue support: direct oral health services; efforts to expand service capacity and improve quality among providers of oral health care services for low-income adults, including seniors; and advocacy efforts to inform policymakers and opinion leaders about important oral health care issues affecting vulnerable Californians.

**Diversity in the Health Professions** Research has shown that people are more likely to utilize health care services when their providers reflect the patients' own racial and ethnic backgrounds and speak the same languages. Grants related to this issue support: education and skill building for underrepresented minority youth and adults to prepare them to enter and sustain careers within California's health sector; and expansion of job opportunities for underrepresented minorities in the health professions.









## Promoting Healthy & Safe Neighborhoods

The health of a community profoundly influences the health of its people. Wellness is promoted by safe and healthy communities that include systems and infrastructure that support sustainable and economically vital neighborhoods, social connectedness and civic engagement. Grants in this portfolio support efforts that benefit vulnerable populations, including people of color; women and girls; and low-income individuals and families. In particular, funding within this portfolio addresses healthy environments and violence prevention.



**Healthy Environments** Funding in this area relates to both natural and built environments and is concerned with developing and fortifying elements within communities that foster the health and wellness of their residents. Grantmaking related to this issue supports: efforts to improve air and water quality and minimize exposure to toxins; efforts to improve access to healthy and nutritious food; and efforts to improve access to parks, open space and other places for community building, recreation and physical activity.

After becoming involved with the **Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice** in Southern California’s Inland Empire, a woman shared her thoughts at a public hearing for the first time.

**“Two hundred people in the audience applauded,” she said. “I never thought anybody cared what I thought or said. Now I know I matter.”**

The woman went on to participate in a two-year battle to stop a polluting facility that endangered the health of her community, playing a key role in translating materials and motivating her neighbors to stay involved. As a result, the company moved from the neighborhood and changed their site of operations.

**Violence Prevention** Funding for violence prevention relates to protecting and fortifying communities to be safe and healthy for their residents. Grantmaking related to this issue supports: the prevention of gun violence; efforts to foster emerging and existing leaders committed to violence prevention; and community engagement to develop and maintain safe and healthy communities.







## Expanding Education & Employment Pathways

Education and employment are strong predictors of good health. Research indicates that a person's health improves as his or her income level rises, yet access to higher-wage jobs is typically available to only the best educated. This portfolio supports education and employment programs for vulnerable populations that have been priorities for the Foundation throughout its history: low-income people of color, including youth, ages 14 to 26, who are incarcerated or exiting the juvenile justice system; are exiting foster care; or are homeless and/or runaways; as well as re-entry youth and adults.



**Pathways to Employment** Health is supported by access to sufficient income and other resources through fair employment and appropriate government benefits, as well as the building and protection of financial assets. Grantmaking related to this issue supports: efforts to improve access to quality jobs for low-income Californians; and efforts to ensure the financial security and health of low-income Californians by helping them to maximize their incomes, and build and protect their assets.

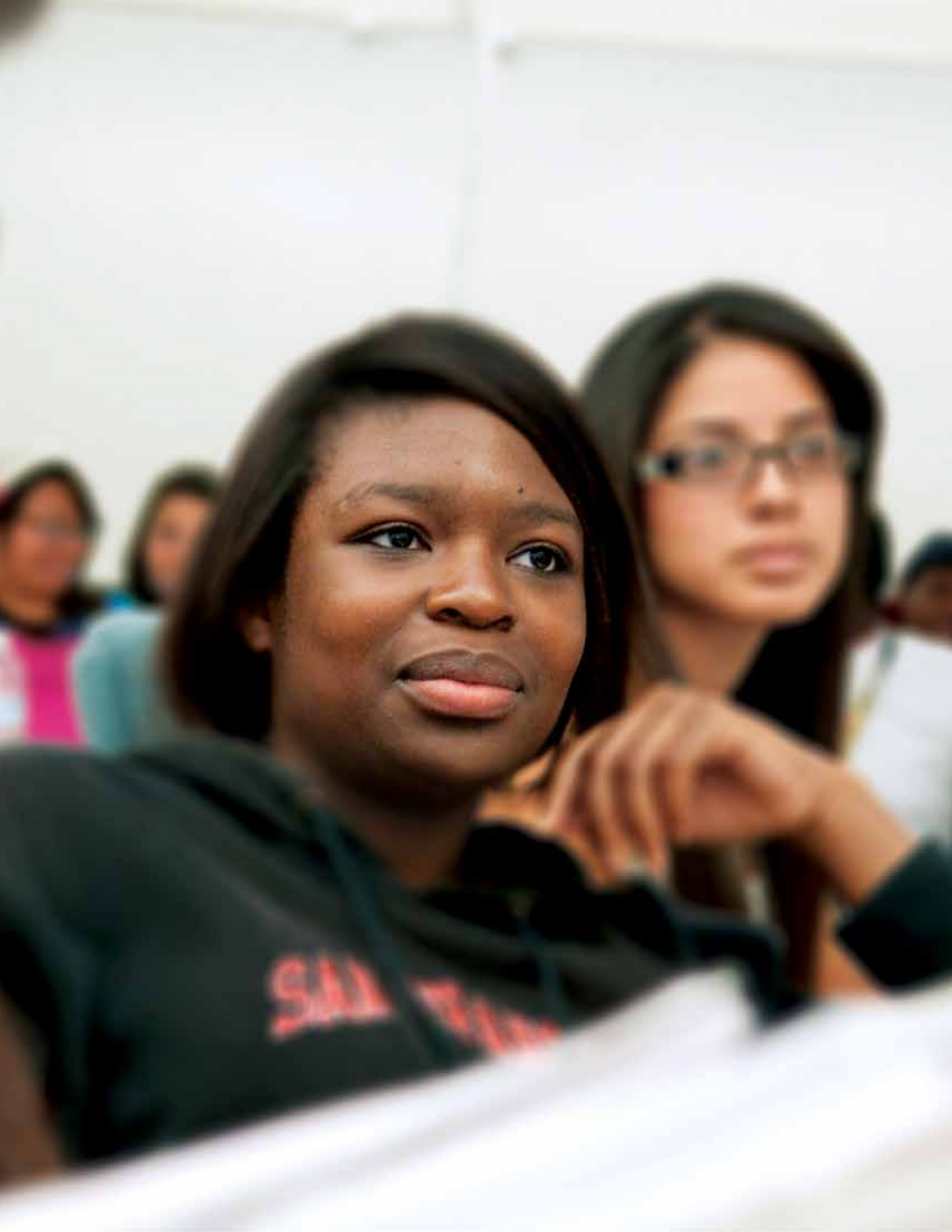
**Education and Youth** Increasing access to educational resources and opportunities, as well as supports for the completion of educational goals, advances health outcomes and equity. Grantmaking related to this issue includes: postsecondary education, vocational schools and apprenticeship programs for youth as pathways to health; social support services, such as shelter and mentoring, to help youth pursue college and/or vocational education; and efforts to support and strengthen organizations that provide health-promoting social supports for vulnerable youth.

**The Anti-Recidivism Coalition (ARC)** engages in policy advocacy, mentors incarcerated youth and supports the formerly incarcerated as they re-enter society (termed “re-entry youth”). ARC received core operating support from Cal Wellness for public policy efforts addressing the legal barriers to employment and education for incarcerated and re-entry youth in California. ARC engages the youth in policy advocacy efforts.

“After spending five years in and out of the juvenile justice system, I was that guy that people would say could never change,” said James Anderson, now 21, who works as a program administrator with ARC and who serves on the State Advisory Committee on Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

“Thanks to someone who was determined to show me that I was worth something, I was able to make a transition. Now I am in college full time, and I work at ARC—dedicated to helping other people with backgrounds like mine.”







## Opportunity Fund

This portfolio seeks to attract more support from both philanthropic and policy sectors to improve the health of underserved Californians and to foster innovative approaches to address health disparities. Funding within this portfolio falls into three categories.

**Capacity Building** Grantmaking in this area seeks to strengthen nonprofit health organizations through capacity-building convenings, technical assistance efforts, nonprofit leadership development and recognition programs. Grants in this category also seek to ensure that philanthropy is responsive to the health needs of underserved California communities through learning and evaluation efforts, and knowledge sharing.

**Public Policy** Grantmaking for public policy complements the Foundation's efforts to address issues from a systemic perspective and focuses on emerging issues that fall outside of the other portfolios.

To help inform policymakers engaged in health care reform, Cal Wellness has funded the Field Research Corporation to survey voters in seven languages and dialects—English, Spanish, Cantonese, Mandarin, Korean, Vietnamese and Tagalog—about their attitudes toward health policies.

**“I really appreciate the longevity of this project,”** said Secretary Diana S. Dooley of the California Health and Human Services Agency at a briefing to share findings of the seventh annual Cal Wellness/Field Health Policy Survey held at the state Capitol in August 2013.

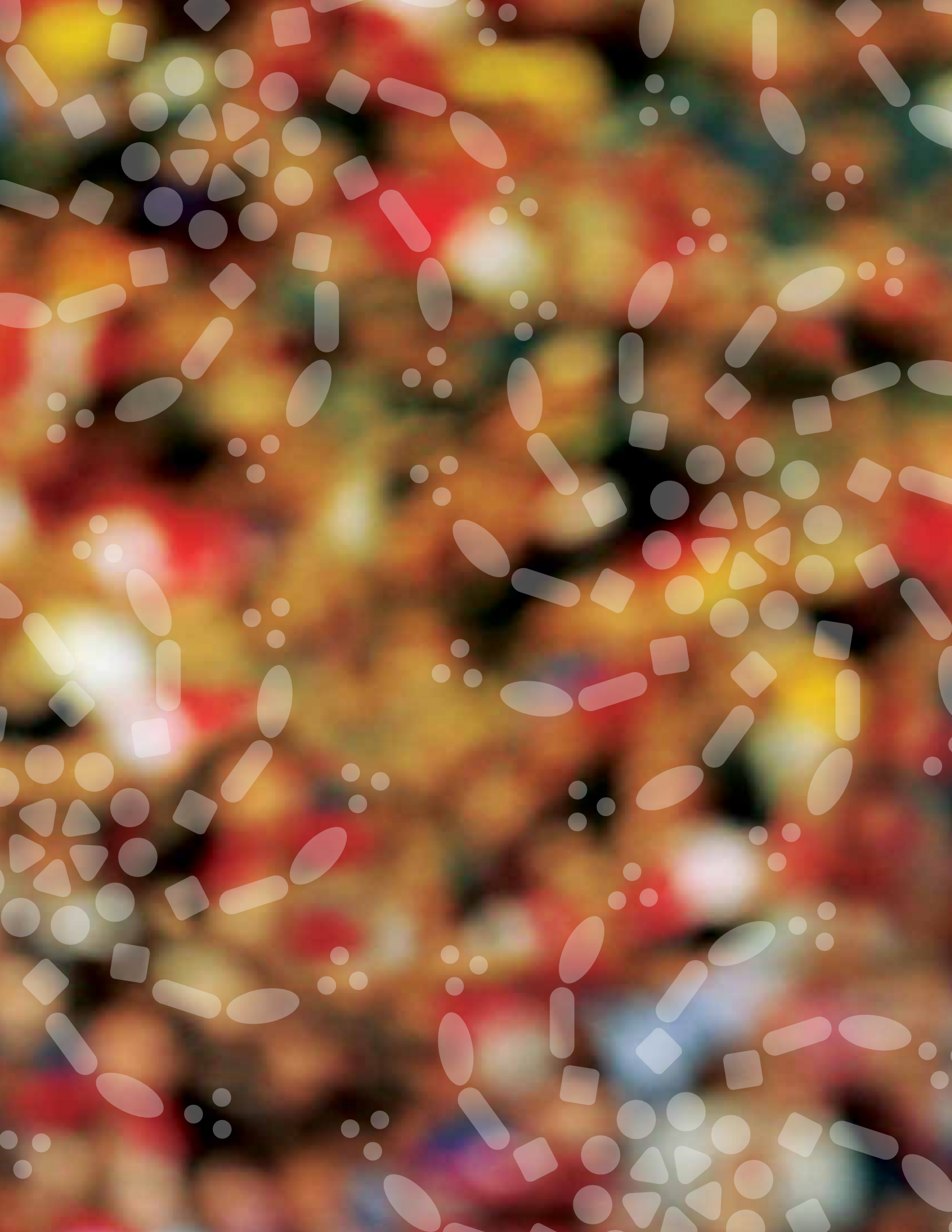

**Innovation** Grantmaking in this area supports promising pilot projects and startup organizations that have the potential to significantly improve the health of those most in need but fall outside the other portfolios. Grantmaking may address health needs that are attributable to changes in circumstances, such as natural disasters. Most grants will be short term and project focused. Of particular interest are fresh approaches to entrenched problems that are timely and have the potential to serve as models for others.

This latest evolution in our grantmaking is about achieving health for all Californians. At Cal Wellness we are mindful that we do not pursue our mission alone, but we depend on the dedicated efforts of our grantees—truly, they are our community partners.

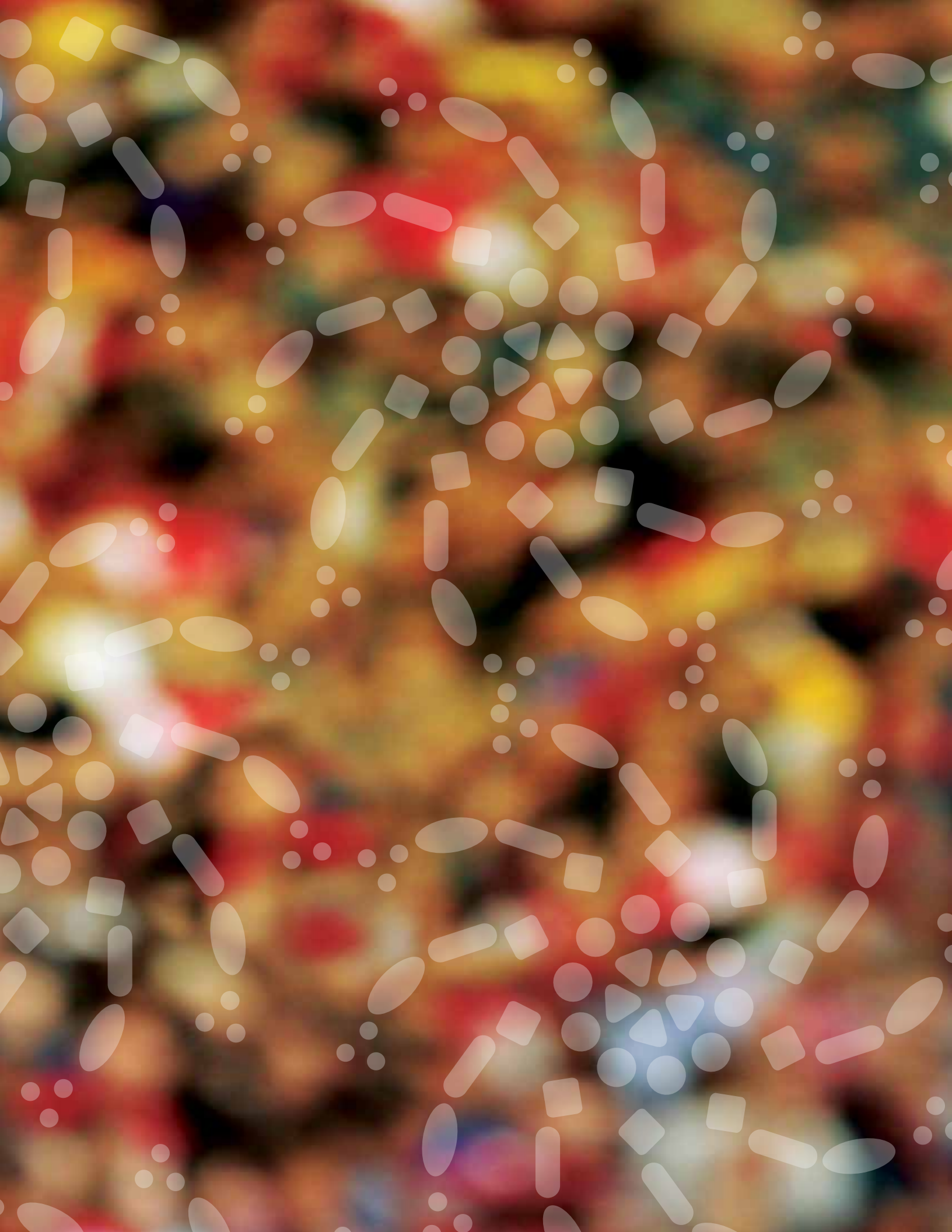

The California Wellness Foundation's condensed statements of financial position and activities for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012 are presented in this section.

To present a clear picture of the endowment balance available for charitable purposes, the Foundation has provided condensed financial statement information that departs from generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) in two ways. First, the accompanying condensed financial statements report only the statements of financial position on December 31, 2013 and 2012 and statements of activities for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012 and do not include statements of cash flow or the accompanying notes to financial statements. Second, the Foundation has captured under the term "investments," investment sales receivable and investment purchases payable.

The Foundation's financial statements undergo an annual audit, which was performed by Grant Thornton LLP for the year ended December 31, 2013, and by Bregante + Company LLP for the year ended December 31, 2012. The Foundation's audited financial statements for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012 are presented in conformity with GAAP, and the auditor expressed an unqualified opinion on these financial statements.
